Why Should I Bother Paying Lake Association Dues

I hear this more often than I'd like to. So, here are my thoughts on this subject.

First, the BIG one! The Rideau Valley Conservation Authority (RVCA) samples the water in most lakes in this area 3 – 4 times each year. Samples are taken for E. coli bacteria, Nitrogen and Phosphorus. The Nitrogen and Phosphorus readings help to determine the "health" of the lake. Due to budget cuts, the frequency and the number of sites have been reduced. OLLA membership dues pay for additional sampling around the shore of the lake. Each sample costs between \$25 and \$50. We try and sample 4 additional sites around the lake 3-4 times. That works out to between \$400 and \$800 each year. That works out to between 7 & 14 membership fees. OLLA currently has only 80 or so members out of over 340 households around the lake.

Why do we do this? Well, the bacteria test is pretty clear. We don't want people or pets getting sick. Over half the people on the lake use lake water for household purposes. We need to know if it isn't safe.

As for the Nitrogen and Phosphorus tests, picture your house as it is now on the lake. What's it worth? Then, imagine that picture where the waterfront is choked with vegetation and algae! Where did your property value go!

By tracking the chemicals, we can localize sources and, hopefully, move to remediate them.

Next up! Benefits. Your membership provides you the opportunity to have a say in messaging to the Township, the RVCA, and the various ministries of Natural Resources, Environment, etc.

Your membership also entitles you to member benefits of the Federation of Ontario Cottagers' Associations, (FOCA). FOCA has a huge amount of information related to lake living, including research on topics like road maintenance and fees, insurance, capital planning and much, much more. FOCA also provides members with discounts on things like cellphones, wireless connectivity and insurance.

OLLA provides newsletters and other information about things and activities around the lake, organizes roadside clean-up campaigns and some social activities.

This Spring, the Board of Directors is hoping to increase the number of members in our organization. And, to address "the elephant in the room", there is a history where the association did not provide what some members wanted. Some of those things are outside the mandate of the organization. If you want to check out what the mandate includes, you can find it on the OLLA website (https://otterlake.org/business/constitution/). History is about the past. We need to focus on the future for ourselves and our families. The OLLA Board of Directors is looking to you to help us with this by renewing or re-instating your membership and talking to your neighbours about joining us.

Cormorants on Otter Lake

Last fall I received an email from OLLA members Kim and Blair Gemmell about Cormorants (Doublecrested Cormorants). The article prompted me to do a bit more research since, as many of you have noticed, Cormorants have returned to Otter Lake. Google came up with oodles of articles. Some, emotional, some strictly scientific and everything in between.

First a bit of history! Cormorants first came to Ontario (Lake of the Woods) in 1798. The earliest recorded nesting was in 1920 in Black Bay of Lake Superior. Nesting in Lake Ontario and the surrounding region was recorded in 1938. Populations declined for many years but increased rapidly in the 1970's following the ban of DDT.

Cormorants mature at 3 years of age and can live to 20 years of age although the average is around 8 years. They normally lay 3-4 eggs although, on average, only 2 chicks survive. Both parents are involved in looking after the nest. Cormorants are "colonial" nesters. They like company. The nests are found both on the ground and in trees.

The Cormorant's diet consists primarily of small fish although they also eat molluscs and invertebrates.

Concerns around Cormorants relate primarily to their waste (guano). As with the waste of geese around the lake, it's not something residents are likely to appreciate. Cormorant guano is very high in ammonia and can easily destroy vegetation in roosting areas.

Another concern raised by some is the competition with local Loon populations (and perhaps anglers) for fish. Studies have shown that the cormorant's diet contains only about 3% game/sport fish species.

Nature's Neighbour - Solar Panels

This feature, called Nature's Neighbour, is intended to address and inspire those who are curious about ways to live in harmony with nature.

Owners at the OLLA AGM seemed to have an interest in becoming stewards of their own environment and wanted to know more about what others have done. This particular article will look at solar panel installation and energy efficient design.

Perhaps you've seen the round cottage with 24 solar panels on Otter Lake Road. It was built to be energy efficient as well as comfortable. The round shape provides the least amount of exterior surface area for the volume of space within, and therefore uses a

minimal amount of energy to maintain a comfortable temperature.

The walls have been insulated to R53 (R24 is the norm) and windows are triple pane rather than double. Radiant hydronic heating warms the concrete floor which holds temperature well as a thermal mass.

The entire structure gets all it's energy from solar power with no fossil fuels used except for the lawn mowing.

After much thought of which technologies to use, simplicity became the primary factor. Maintenance and repairs needed to be kept minimal, as well as having a reliable power source.

The largest expense on a solar installation is batteries. But batteries can be avoided entirely by keeping the Hydro One grid connection through the Net Metering program. Staying connected costs very little, and power can be exchanged between the solar panels and the grid at no charge if there remains a surplus for the solar power generated over a one-year period.

Consider the benefits of a proven alternative that helps the environment and ourselves.

The following is a brief summary from Hydro One: Our Net Metering program is available to any Hydro One customer who generates electricity primarily for their own use from a renewable energy source (wind, water, solar radiation or agricultural biomass). Net metering allows you to send electricity generated from Renewable Energy Technologies (RETs) to Hydro One's distribution system for a credit towards your electricity costs. Excess generation credits can be carried forward for a consecutive 12-month period to offset future electricity costs.

What we can do to help Climate Change

Shoreline Planting

Planting along your shoreline helps reduce erosion, helps filter ground water running into the lake and trees and shrubs provide shade and soak up carbon from the atmosphere. A good time to plant trees or shrubs in Eastern Ontario is in the early spring, after the ground thaws.

- Native shrubs which enjoy wet to moist conditions at your shoreline include Red Osier Dogwood (1-3 metres, full sun). Highbush Cranberry (1-4 metres, sun and shade) and Sweet Gale (1.5 metres, full sun).
- Native trees which do well on shorelines in wet to moist conditions include Silver Maple (20-25 metres, full to partial sun), and Larch (Tamarack) (up to 25 metres, full sun).
- Native wildflowers which do well on shorelines in wet to moist conditions include Cardinal Flower (full sun), Spotted Joe Pye-Weed (full sun) and Blue Flag Iris (full sun).
- Avoid introducing any invasive species. E.g. Invasive Phragmites, European Frogbit, Buckthorn, dog-strangling Vine, garlic mustard, tree of Heaven, purple loosestrife, white sweet clover and others.

Ice and the Lake



Residents on water like to keep track of what that water is doing. For many, it's the temperature. On the coasts, it's all about tides. For most lakes in Canada, ICE is the big topic.

Many people around Otter Lake track Ice On and Ice Off dates. Some members, including the McKenney's, have shared that data with us. However, we are still missing a couple of dates! Here's what we are looking for:

- Any dates prior to the 1978/1979 winter
- Ice On for 1978/79
- Ice On for 1994/1995
- Ice On for 2008/2009
- Ice Off for 2011/2012

It's very clear that climate change is reducing the number of days that Otter Lake is frozen. The following graph focuses on that trend.



The following chart shows the winners for earliest and latest dates.

Ice Off	March 14, 2024	April 27, 2018

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
